This month's program: "Winter Gulls" with Lisa Hug

... Saturday - October 8, 2022 Huichica Creek, Larry Kent, 8:00AM – 12:00PM 🛛 🗟 🏭 🗍

Huichica Creek is a unit of the Napa-Sonoma Wildlife Area in Napa County on the border with Sonoma County. It hosts an abundance of water fowl and shorebirds. We will be led by Larry Kent, one of the top birders in Napa County and one who knows this location well. We will meet at the parking lot at Huichica Creek at the end of Buchli Station Road (38.2147295, -122.3318977). Drive past Hudeman Slough on Ramal Road. Once in Napa County, turn right on Las Amigas Road, then right on Buchli Station Road, continue until just past the railroad tracks. Sunday - October 16, 2022 RROS Fall 2022 Pelagic Trip #2

9 😹 🗍 The birds offshore need our attention, if only to verify their continued existence. Two dates have been reserved this fall for offshore birding trips from Bodega Harbor aboard the 65-foot New Sea Angler, two Sundays, the first, September 18, and the second, October 16, peak times for offshore migrants and whale encounters. The standard route departs Bodega Harbor heading west to Bodega Canyon and the continental shelf, then turning south and east across the Cordell Banks.

What might we see? We should expect to encounter the usual suspects: Black-footed [and maybe Laysan] Albatross, Northern Fulmar, Pink-footed, Buller's, and Sooty Shearwaters, Fork-tailed and Ashy [and maybe Black, Wilson's and/or Leach's] Storm-Petrels. We might hope for Flesh-footed and Short-tailed Shearwaters, though they are rare and can be difficult to spot. Also likely are Sabine's Gull, Common and Arctic Terns, South-Polar Skua, Long-tailed, Parasitic, and Pomarine Jaegers, Red-necked and Red Phalaropes, Common Murre [Pigeon Guillemot near shore], Cassin's and Rhinoceros Auklets, and maybe a Tufted Puffin or a Scripps or Guadalupe Murrelet]. In short, you never know what might turn up. Cetaceans may be conspicuous, with numbers of Humpback and often Blue Whales [largest animal in the world] and perhaps a Fin Whale plus a variety of dolphins, porpoises, and pinnipeds.

Be at Porto Bodega by 6:30am to check in; departure at 7 AM. To break even with this charter each participant will contribute \$170 (\$100 if a student). This adds a diesel-fuel/Ukraine War surcharge to the traditional \$150 fee.

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To reserve a spot on one or the other or both trips, send a post-dated check for the appropriate amount (dated Sept 18 for trip 1 and/or Oct 16 for trip 2) made payable to the New Sea Angler (Bodega Bay Sportfishing Center). Mail them to Gene Hunn at 1504 Smokey Mtn. Dr., Petaluma, CA 94954. I will hold on to them until we sail. In case of cancellation by the Captain due to Covid retrenchment or terrible weather, your check will be returned.

Ellis Creek is one of the best birding hotspots in central Sonoma County, where many rare birds have been documented over the years. We will be led by Craig Roth, who has participated in the Petaluma Wetland's surveys to this spot for many years. Expect water fowl and shore birds. Least Bittern were seen here this year, though they have probably gone into hiding by now. Meet in the parking lot off Cypress Drive, Petaluma (38.2268466, -122.5850014) at 8:00AM.

· Saturday - November 12, 2022, Willow Creek Road with The Tufflis, 8:30AM – 12:30PM, 😿 😹 🗍

Join Teresa and Miles Tuffli for a morning of birding along Willow Creek Road in Jenner. During raptor migration season, we'll have the potential for multiple species - Ferruginous Hawks, American Kestrels, Bald Eagles, and more. Many wintering and year-round passerines will be frequenting the willows, alders, and scrub. With a view of the Russian River, we'll look for some water birds as well.

We'll meet at the defunct Russian House #1 restaurant, and bird the road's entrance on foot. We'll then move all cars down the road to a large pullout. We'll bird the willows, creek area, and river view on foot before continuing down the road (birders are encouraged to carpool from there), stopping to bird various sections.

No bathrooms. Heavy rain cancels. Bring layers, water, lunch or snacks, and sunscreen.

Location & Directions: The address for the defunct Russian House #1 is 9960 CA-1, Jenner, California 95450. If coming from Bodega Bay, it's 9 miles north directly along CA-1 (15-20 mins), on the right just before the Russian River bridge. If coming from River Road/ Highway 116, take Highway 116 west through Guerneville, Monte Rio, and Duncans Mills until you reach the Y-intersection w/ CA-1. Head left (south) on Highway 1, and the defunct Russian House #1 is on your left immediately after crossing the Russian River bridge. El Encanto Reserve Ecoturistica

High in the Andes southeast of Cali, Colombia, outside the town of Palastina in the Huila region, is a sweet preserve and bird sanctuary visited by birders and general tourists alike. Catch a ride with a local in a dusty pickup near the Palastina plaza, and they'll transport you miles up the rutted switchbacks and narrow passes to an enchanting clearing, the home of the Molina-Cruz family.

Once primarily a coffee plantation, this acreage has been developed by the family to promote ecotourism. In the process, they figure, they will save this picturesque land for generations. They share the property with feathered friends like the Shining Green hummingbird, Tolima Dove, the Golden-eared Tanager.

On the property, there is a two-story bamboo lodge, with outdoor kitchen and dining tables for guests. Hand-hewn steps lead to the inn, or cottages, all bamboo with quiet panoramas of the surrounding mountains. Here, the family hosts their guests - farm stays, birding retreats, and lone hikers.



Important to birders are the 350 species of birds visiting the property. The Colombian Chachalaca, Andean Emerald, Indigo-capped Hummingbird, Velvet- fronted Euphonia, Gorsetted Woodstar and others, visit the plethora of feeders placed at the far end of a grassy stretch.



But it is the visit to an adjoining property further up the mountain that is most thrilling. There, the family leads you on a slippery track through the densest of rain forests. Silent but for the drizzling rain and distant calls of a White-bellied Antpitta, one is transported. Suddenly, an unexpected mudslide impedes your progress on the trail. But the Molinas know instantly what to do. Out comes the machete, palm fronds and logs are laid across, and you are safely led to a look-out. Hacked out of the moist green forest, you are provided sweet hot coffee from a thermos, and a hand cleaved chair to rest. You are shown the hidden bird blinds from which to watch a Violetfronted Brilliant hummingbird, and White-throated Quail Dove and the Chestnut-capped Brushfinch. Need a bathroom? The Molinas are prepared: from a secret cache, a roll of TP is brought forth, and you are saved from embarrassment.

Visit the Molina-Cruz family next time you are in Colombia. They can use the help from appreciative Americans in their pursuit to keep this mountain region open to the birds.
